



DEER TO CARE

Stretch (Michael) O'Neill—recently retired Southland Farm Machinery sales consultant, long serving volunteer fireman and recipient of the Queen's Service Medal for services to the New Zealand Fire Service and the community, and all-round good bloke—is now involved with a community initiative like no other.

Stretch volunteers for a new enterprise in Southland that turns hunting into helping, by providing processed wild game to those in need.

Deer to Care was created by Stu O'Neill, Wesley Baratcart, and Tim Cook – a group of mates who love the adventure and camaraderie of hunting, but were very aware of the hunger and food insecurity in the community.

With an excess of wild, free-range game available, Stu, Wes and Tim identified the charities in Southland who would most benefit from food assistance, gathered a group of volunteers – including butchers – and with the blessing of MPI and clearance from the team at AWS Legal, Deer to Care was established.

With the aim of an end-to-end supply chain, a hunt takes place each weekend, with the deer recovered and taken directly to a butcher's freezer. The butcher then processes the meat, packs and labels it. The meat – mostly mince – is then delivered by volunteers to the charities that Deer to Care supports, who pass on the meat to those in need.

The butchers involved are an essential part of the process, and either volunteer their time and resources







or offer fair rates. The Deer to Care website states that one deer can produce 30kgs of mince, or 50 packets. With each packet generally enough to create a meal for four people, one deer can result in approximately 200 people being fed.

This makes an undeniable impact to the community, and everyone involved can see the value of their contribution. The initiative also supports retired service people by providing them with the premium cuts of meat as an acknowledgement for their years of service.

Deer to Care is grateful for the support of IFS Growth and OneForest, who have been the backbone of the initiative from inception by allowing the hunts to take place on their forestry blocks – yielding an astonishing 560 deer this year alone. A further 240 deer this year have been donated through hunting competitions.

Of special mention are the charities that Deer to Care work with, such as Women's Refuge, Presbyterian Support, and the Salvation Army. Stu states unequivocally that they are the unsung heroes—quietly working to support those most in need in the community. As are the volunteers who drop off the donated meat to charities – a well-connected, hardworking group of extraordinarily kind-hearted people. A special thanks to Stretch – for his tireless volunteer work in Gore and Mataura, and Hugh Robinson, for his endlessly generous work in Invercargill.

Although Stu is full of praise for those they work alongside, and those who support them, we feel that those who make the Deer to Care dream come to life deserve equal praise. Congratulations to Stu, Wes and Tim on creating a community enterprise with heart that selflessly benefits so many.

Matt Chisholm is a TV personality turned farmer who shares his personal struggles and journey with his own mental health (in an entertaining way) in the hopes of helping others. To support Matt in the work he does in the rural community we have given him a John Deere tractor to use on his block in Central Otago. Here Matt shares his experiences (good, bad and embarrassing!) as he 'ups' his farming game with the help of his John Deere tractor.

I don't think I'm wired up right. Haven't been for a long time. I'm unbelievably obsessive. Actually, sometimes I can be so obsessive about something that I almost can't do anything else. That can be a real problem when I've got heaps of other things to do and like everyone else, I've always got heaps of other things to do. I don't sleep properly. I don't eat properly. I'm going through an obsessive phase at the moment and it's really bad. The other night – I reckon this obsession came close to killing me.

Farming is my passion. My hobby. A very expensive hobby. A hobby that often gets in the way of my real work or our family life. Now, having survived another winter here at our cold-as-charity 29-hectare Chatto Creek 'farm', having fed out those big bales in my wee Southland Farm Machinery John Deere tractor for months, I'm into the lambing and the calving. Twelve Shorthorn cows and 65 Southdown and Swiss Blacknose Valais ewes. I'm sitting in my ute, listening to the strong, freezing cold winds swirl around me as I watch two old Southdown ewes birthing. They're taking their sweet time, and I can't wait.

I got home from a quick family trip to Dunedin at 11pm last night – then, in the dark, I shifted the break for my cattle. It's 6:45am in the morning and, in the dark, again, I've just shifted the break for my cattle. I want to be in at PGG Wrightson at half eight for work, but I've probably got to lamb these two old ewes and finish writing this article first. Then, I'll tag the lambs



and put coats on 'em, so those strong, freezing cold winds don't pierce through their thin skins and stop their small hearts. That's already happened a few times this season. Even though I know they're coming, those deaths crush me.

For me, farming is like any good drug. The lows are horrific – the highs as good as anything I've ever experienced. Anyway, I've almost finished my instant coffee – no milk this time – I've forgotten to get it for the past two days because I've only got farming on my

mind. I'm watching the clock, trying to figure out how much time I've got before I have to pull some lambs, finish this yarn, and shower for work. Forty minutes. I've got just forty minutes. So, what I've decided to do is write about how I almost got killed the other night, before the lambing and the showering.

The Shorthorn cows belong to a mate. We go halves in the calves – I get the heifers to build up my herd – he gets the bulls. 'Horse Face' had a nice wee red calf the other night, but I couldn't see whether it was a bull or a heifer and whether it was going to be mine or my mates. I had a plan. I'd jump the electric fence, run at Horse Face – the scariest, most protective cow on the place, and while trying to scare her away lift the leg of the sitting down calf and check its sex.

I executed the plan perfectly until I got to the calf and slipped on the cow's birthing fluids and fell clean on my back. Horse Face, who isn't stupid, knew it was her time to strike. With my oldest boy, Bede, watching out the ute window, and me lying on my back, feet in the air, Horse Face charges at me over and over, again and again. I kick back, like I've never kicked before, over and over, again and again.

The fracas goes on for what seems like about five minutes. It probably goes on for closer to five seconds. Horse Face backs off for a bit – I jump to my feet, run and scale the fence, with my eyes fixed firmly on Horse Face. Then I laugh out loud – the kind of inappropriate laugh you laugh when you realise things could have been a whole lot worse. The only thing that hurts is my pride. Nine-year-old Bede says, 'Dad, you're such an idiot, that cow could have killed you.' I reply, 'I know I'm an idiot, Bede, I'm actually surprised it's taken you nine years to figure it out.'

My phone though. In the madness my phone fell out of my pocket. I'd have to scale the fence again to retrieve it. When Horse Face looks away for a second or two I take another chance, grab my phone, and discover wee red is a girl. Hallelujah people, she's ours.

Keep living the dream – I've got to go lamb a ewe before work.


